What is FHE?

Families for Home Education is the oldest and largest homeschool organization in Missouri; serving ALL home educators since 1983. FHE is operated by a volunteer board of directors, and maintains a lobbyist in Jefferson City throughout the legislative session.

For 40 years, FHE's message has remained the same. We exist to recognize and protect the right of every parent in Missouri to educate their child at home. We seek no financial aid from any government entity, and we ask for no further restrictions on the current statute governing home education in Missouri.

FHE has had many board members, directors, and lobbyists over the years. But the message remains the same. No board member has ever received compensation for their service. Some expenses may be covered, but we remain an all-volunteer organization since 1983. Our strength comes from our membership.

What does FHE do for Homeschoolers in Missouri?

- FHE maintains a lobbyist in Jefferson City throughout the entire legislative session.
- FHE publishes *First Things First*, a guide for the Missouri Home Educator, providing complimentary copies to libraries, media, school officials, and support group leaders when needed.
- FHE publishes the Homeschool Journal for maintaining your records/hours.
- FHE supplies speakers for your support group meetings or local events and provides informational booths at local events and homeschool conventions.
- FHE publishes a newsletter, the FHE Bulletin, twice a year.
- FHE maintains a legislative alert network to keep you informed when the need arises for quick communication with your legislator regarding pending legislation.
- FHE maintains a website and a toll-free phone line in order to provide service and legally accurate information to home educators throughout the state.
- FHE maintains relationships and communication with HSLDA, working hand-in-hand to ensure your right to home educate in the state of Missouri.
- FHE holds workshops and special events for new home educators in order to connect them with the homeschool community and provides materials and information.
- FHE has acted as a liaison for home school families with the Department of Elementary and Secondary Education, and with the Department of Social Services in Missouri.
- FHE holds an annual homeschool day at the state capitol.

Basic Information:

IF you have a child who has NOT been in the public school system for K or 1st grade (public school preschool does not count), then you will not have to notify anyone with a withdrawal letter.

IF your child HAS been enrolled in public school K for the fall and withdraw before the school starts back after New Year's, then you will need to contact FHE

(region5director@fhe-mo.org) for the appropriate withdrawal letter. Send as described below. In both cases, you will NOT have to keep records or track hours until that child's 7th birthday.

IF you have a child in public school K into the second half of the year or all 1st graders who have attended K the previous school year, you will need the normal withdrawal letter below and keep hours / records even if the child is not 7 years old yet. All other grades will need the normal withdrawal letter below.

IF you have moved to Missouri from another state, a withdrawal letter is not needed regardless of grade.

IF you have a 16 year old and pulling from high school, you will need to withdraw, but you will not need to follow the law for records or hours. You will only need to deal with any documentation you need for a transcript.

Here are the basics that you need to know. First, you will want to send the school a withdrawal letter (one per child). If at a private school, then follow their exit policy. Here is a sample you can use. https://fhe-mo.org/withdrawalletter Send it to the superintendent or principal by certified mail. This way you can track your letter to ensure that it is received by the school. Keep copies of receipts and delivery information. Please do **not** sign the letter from the school since you are not required by law to do so, and they use their letter to continue to receive partial funding for your child who is no longer there.

Now for the law. https://fhe-mo.org/missourilaw Our school year runs from July 1 to June 30. That does not mean you have to open the schoolbook on July 1, but you can start logging educational hours. Lots of things count in the summer like PE, field trips, art projects, music, ALL reading and audiobooks, documentaries, life skills like cooking, etc. We need 1000 hours of instruction during this time frame. At least 600 of the 1000 hours need to be in the following subjects that we like to call core: reading, language arts, math, science, social studies, or academic courses that are related to such subject areas and consonant with the child's age and ability. You are not required to have a certain number of hours in each subject, just a total of 600 hours. At least 400 of those 600 hours need to be at your regular home school location, which for most of us is our own homes. That leaves you with 400 additional hours (1000-600) that can be whatever you want: more of the core, all noncore or any combo. Non-core hours are subjects like PE, music, art, life skills, computer skills, etc.

You also need to keep some records.

- (a) Maintain the following records:
- a. A plan book, diary, or other written record indicating subjects taught and activities engaged in; and b. A portfolio of samples of the child's academic work; and
- c. A record of evaluations of the child's academic progress; or

d. Other written, or credible evidence equivalent to subparagraphs a., b. and c.; AND

3. The production of a daily log by a parent, guardian, or other person having control or custody of a child showing that a home school has a course of instruction that satisfies the requirements of this section and section 167.031 or, in the case of a pupil sixteen years of age or older who attended a metropolitan school district the previous year, a written statement that the pupil is attending home school in compliance with section 167.031 shall be a defense to any prosecution under section 167.031 and to any charge or action for educational neglect brought under chapter 210. Home school education enforcement and records pursuant to this section, and sections 210.167 and 211.031, shall be subject to review only by the local prosecuting attorney.

*A plan book can be anything: teacher lesson book, calendar, journal, notebook, Word/Google doc, etc. Just needs to list out what you have done and where you have gone. Example:

Tuesday, Mar 10

Math - lesson 50 OR multiplication worksheet (30 minutes)

Language Arts- spelling list #25 and read chapter 2 of Charlotte's Web (45 minutes)

Science - field trip to Science Center (3 hours)

Keep things split out by subject. The non-core can be dumped into one title (non-core) or into different subjects (PE, music, art, etc.).

*The portfolio of samples is just that. You don't have to keep everything, but you do need some throughout the year in the subjects.

*The evaluation can be a standardized test IF that is what you choose. We are not required to do testing as homeschoolers. Other options for the evaluation are creating a report card, keeping quizzes/tests (can also be part of our samples), or doing a brief write-up of what has been accomplished and what still needs work. Example:

Math - knows multiplication tables and ready for double digits, still needs practice on division Language Arts - finished 2nd grade spelling and grammar, ready for 3rd grade; needs work on reading comprehension

High School Information:

As homeschoolers, we have no high school graduation requirements. You will issue the diploma and transcript which are both legal. The first big question to consider is what your teen is planning on after graduation. Although we can legally do whatever we want and graduate our teens, colleges, tech schools, and the military all have specific requirements. We generally recommend going with a college prep route simple because teens change their minds, and you just don't know what they will end up doing. You do not have to spend a fortune on curriculum. Again, you need to decide if you want online or books, religious based or secular. Some are actually free like Easy Peasy All in One, Khan Academy, and Discovery K12 (not the same as the public school online K12 program). Dual enrollment at the community college is also a great option. One semester class at the college gets the college credit but also worth one full year credit on the high school transcript. The cost does come out of your pocket, but much cheaper than regular college costs.
